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Why the Church Must Teach

At this writing there are three weeks left of summer break for Montgomery County students. Back-to-school supplies are out. Back-to-school clothes are in. Last minute vacation deals are on.

By comparison, there is a similar but silent preparation that takes place in churches during this time as well, preparation for a new Christian Education year! At CPBC, most of the Sunday morning teachers have been on break and children's classes have been combined to accommodate the summer attendance trend. Unlike the academic arena, Christian education is not mandated by the state, so the law does not require it. Our on-going task is reminding Christians of the higher mandate for their Christian education, a higher mandate for the cultivation of their Christian

discipleship.

Early in my tenure, I preached on Christian Education Sunday from a sermon entitled, *Why the Church Must Teach*. I believe that the points of that sermon are still relevant and can help us to understand Christian education's rightful place in our lives. Also to see Christian education's value, not only to us but also to the world.

First, the church must teach because man is sinful and the holy God judges sin without mercy. Christians must teach the truth about man's condition before God and the penalty that condition incurs, eternal separation from God. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23a).

Second, the church must teach because in Christ God has expressed

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His desire for forgiveness over condemnation or separation. God reveals in His word, both written and Living, that He is a personal Creator who calls the creature man back to relationship with Himself. "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him (John 3:16, 17).

Clifton Park Baptist Church is a congregation on assignment. We are a people living intentionally and purposefully for the Lord. So, I continue to give thanks that on July 27, 2011, at our summer business meeting, our church adopted a new purpose statement that recognizes the mission that the Lord has given us. As our new purpose statement reads, we are, Clifton Park Baptist Church: *Leading the Way, Teaching the Truth and Experiencing the Life*.

And why is this statement significant? Purpose and vision have always been important to God and to God's people. In fact, Solomon stated very clearly: *where there is no vision, the people perish* (Prov. 29:18). In other words, vision is so important that without it congregations and communities fall apart. But, what is vision? We all understand that in the physical sense, vision is the ability to perceive through the use of sight. When we consider vision in the life of the church, we speak of something similar. Very simply, vision in the church is the ability to discern and understand the direction in which God is leading. To say it another way: God's vision for Clifton Park is what He saw when He brought us together.

God's vision is what binds us together in common purpose; it is that which both captivates us and connects us. It keeps us moving in the same direction, guided by God and empowered by His Spirit. Vision keeps us on point and on task; it keeps us focused and encourages us to submit all of our personal agendas to the completion of what God is calling us as a Body to fulfill. And so, more specifically, our new purpose statement says that we are:

- **Leading the Way.** Clifton Park Baptist Church exists to impact lives and to bring spiritual transformation to people and places of the world by sharing the love of Christ. We are a church of action that seeks to illustrate heaven at work by meeting the needs of the community, inspiring Godly leaders and intentionally using our gifts, talents and abilities in the furtherance of the Kingdom of God.

- **Teaching the Truth.** The Word of God is truth that transcends culture and transforms lives. Clifton Park Baptist Church is committed to equipping every member with an understanding of God's Word that they might become authentic disciples of God, following Him faithfully and leading productive and rewarding lives.

- **Experiencing the Life.** Clifton Park Baptist Church is a people in relationship with God, but also a people in relationship with one another. We are living, learning and growing in a safe, multi-cultural community that encourages members to reach their fullest potential in the Lord.

Broken Into Beautiful

Clifton Park's Women's Ministry welcomed nearly 120 women for the annual women's symposium, August 19 and 20. Addressing the theme, *Broken into Beautiful*, guest speaker Rev. Dr. Kecia Decosta-Ford, pastor of Sharp Street Methodist Church (Sandy Spring, Maryland), addressed the necessity of God to break down our outer shell – our outer man – in order to renew and regenerate our inner man “until the day of Christ Jesus.”

Friday night opened with worship and praise, followed by a delicious meal. After dinner, Rev. Dr. Decosta-Ford spoke about what it means to be broken and why it's important. “To be broken means to burst, to bring forth, to collapse the spiritual shell around us,” she said. “Breaking brings out our best.”

She described our outer man as representing ourselves after “the fall,” when the Spirit of God couldn't freely control us because of self will, selfishness and natural life. Our inner man is touched by God, through Jesus. Through our inner man, God is able to use us. Being broken is necessary for God to make us into who *He* wants us to be.

Among her many points, Rev. Dr. Decosta-Ford outlined three things we must learn to accept as Christian women:

- *Our need for forgiveness from God.* All fathers discipline. God, our Father, loves us, chastens us and forgives us. He also allows as well as orders incidents and events in our lives to mold us.

- *Our need for confession to God and conviction by God; to have a contrite heart.* The more we yield to God's Spirit, the more God's Spirit will be revealed in us.
- *Our need to be cleansed by God.* We are here for God's glory. Sometimes God must ‘wipe out’ the competition when we regard ourselves or others too highly. Sometimes God allows us to experience pain to build us up, grow us, or humble us.

Saturday morning, the Men's Ministry blessed the women with a wonderful, hot breakfast, providing sustenance for the teaching to come. Rev. Dr. Decosta-Ford returned, focusing on beauty: “What About Beauty?” She emphasized the equal or greater importance of respecting and beautifying ourselves on the inside – in our hearts – with as much effort as we spend beautifying our temples on the outside.

She said, “It is our hearts, our inner man that is renewed daily in Christ, which must be built up,” She also pointed out that the Bible speaks of beauty beyond physical appearance; in terms of honor, strength and other characteristics, like those describing the woman in Proverbs 31.

Sunday worship brought Women's Weekend to a joyous close as Pastor Lewis preached the sermon, ‘God's Not Through With You Yet,’ based on Philippians 1:6, “...being confident in this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.” The weekend was fulfilling in teaching and in fellowship and underscored our need to be broken into beautiful. ■

The CPBC library will open its doors in October 2011 as a full service, Christian-based lending library. Services will be very similar to your community library and include the check-out/check-in of books/periodicals/audio & video material, place books on hold, charge and collect fees for overdue and lost books, renew materials and more.

You may be asking what prompted the change after so many years? I believe it was always a goal of our Minister of Education, Janet Henley, to have our

library become a lending library, or at least a viable library that could be used by the congregation. Our Fall 2011 Connection Point focuses on a detailed study of the Bible and it is imperative that our library offer the resources and references needed for research by our members.

To have access to the library requires that a CPBC member register for and be issued a library patron/card number. The library will be open once a month (as a trial) beginning in October 2011.

Our library policies will

be posted on the CPBC website, and library brochures with our policies will be inserted in an upcoming church bulletin. The library team email is www.library@cpbc.net and the library team members are Jan Baird-Adams, Donna Sharp and Suzanne Womble.

The CPBC library will also be accessible from the CPBC website to search for books in our library. This search capability can be used from any mobile device that has internet capability. Hopefully in the future we will add scanning

capability of books and patron bar codes, Wi-fi connection in the library, and accessibility for our CPBC members hooked on their Nook and Kindle Readers.

What an exciting project this has been for the Library Team! We pray that the library will greatly aid you in your research and that you will exemplify excellent stewardship toward the library materials God is providing us in this library. We anxiously look forward to serving you. ■

“Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God’s will is—His good, pleasing, and perfect will.” Romans 12:2 (NIV)

Church retreats are ideal opportunities for spiritual renewal of the Family of God while away from the pressures and routine of ordinary life. As I’ve learned from our discipleship classes, God is always trying to get our attention, and we need to learn to be quiet and listen to His voice.

In 1997, Clifton Park began convening its All Church Family Retreats at the Black Rock Retreat Center in Quarryville, PA, which provides the amenities that can enhance the church’s worship, learning and fellowship opportunities; it also provides more of the conveniences of home.

As always, we continue to focus first and foremost on our relationship with the Lord through in-depth Bible study, prayer

and meditation in a distraction-free atmosphere. The teachings and open discussions are designed to provide unique opportunities to experience God’s presence in our own lives. Whether it is having a very personal encounter with Him during individual quiet time and meditation, or whether it is an intimate encounter with God through a special time of praise and worship, the climate is ripe for the leading of the Holy Spirit. It should also be mentioned that nothing equals the sunrise devotionals, or the early morning prais-ercise classes that are led by our trained fitness personnel, and are gentle, but brutal (I believe that is an oxymoron)



workout sessions. The prais-ercise classes are excellent mind, body and soul workouts and a great way to begin the day.

Finally, an All Church Family Retreat is also a time when we get together and have just plain old fun through a variety of activities of interest to the younger as well as to the older in attendance; e.g., friendly competition through competitive sports, board games, Amateur Night at the Apollo, and several other activities that will whet the appetite for more.

This year, October 7 – 9, 2011, marks our 14th consecutive year of partnering with the Black Rock Retreat Center. Our 2011 Retreat leader is Pastor Kirk Houston, Pastor of Gethsemane Community Fellowship Baptist Church in Norfolk, VA. He will bring a message that will help equip us to become messengers of hope within our surrounding community and beyond. The children and youth will have their own special time of study and fellowship.

For those of you who will be attending the All Church Family Retreat this year, the prayer of the Retreat Committee is that you will be transformed by the renewing of your mind and develop a closer and personal relationship with God the Father.

Why The Church Must Teach

(cont. from pg 1) “For Christ died for sins once for all...to bring you to God” (1 Pet. 3:18a). “God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself (2 Cor. 5:18a).

Third, the church must teach because once we come to God through Christ, we must know how to live in relationship with Him. One has said that “the greatest threat to the church [today] is not persecution but assimilation.” The salt losing its saltiness. God’s standards of righteousness are forever challenged by the moral issues of the day primarily related to sex and money. Christians, however, are instructed to live differently as stated in 1 Peter 1:14-16, “As obedient children, do not conform to the evil desires you had when you lived in ignorance. But just as He who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do.” 1 John 2:15,16 says, “Do not love the world or anything in the world.”

Fourth, the church must teach because we must be equipped for

the responsibilities that go along with being God’s people. Never think that your life in Christ is a discovery for self-fulfillment only, but know that it is also a discovery to be shared in three primary roles in which you must be equipped: as priests, disciplinarians and bodybuilders. As priests we offer a word from God, as disciplinarians we share the gospel of God and as bodybuilders we build up the people of God.

As priests. Often we are called upon to comfort persons in their difficult moments, to be priests and to bring a word from God. (See 2 Corinthians 1:3-4.) An unknown teacher says that: A minister of God can do a great deal by merely being there. Company is sympathy . . . But after silent sympathy has done all it can, consolation still has to be given in words. It must be God’s word. *As disciplinarians.* Once a person receives Christ, we set out to make them disciples of Christ by “teaching

them” the word (establishing them in the disciplines and doctrines), and by modeling before them the Christ-life. (See Matthew 28:18-20). As *bodybuilders.* We discover, sharpen and use our spiritual gifts in service to the church. “Now the manifestation of the Spirit has been given for the common good” (1 Cor. 12:7) . . . “so that the body of Christ might be built up” (Ephesians 4:12).

Finally, *the church must teach, because the church is constantly in labor, giving birth to spiritual babies who need the pure milk of the word.* “Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow in your salvation” (1 Pet. 2:2), *and because the church is always in process, still being built into a spiritual house* (1 Pet. 2:5). “You also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.”

God has called us to what only He can do through us and He has not intended that we walk this journey alone. We walk it through Him with one another by His Word. ■

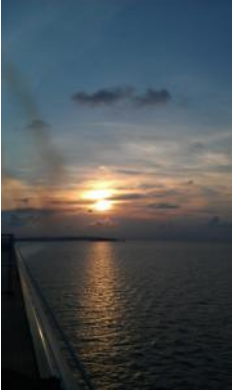

(cont. from pg 2) had nowhere to call his own. He came to serve, instead of being served. He also gave up being worshipped and adored. Just as Jesus loved and sacrificed for us, so we obeyed his commands and went on a mission to the Gambia to encourage, help and strengthen our brethren.

We stopped at Goree Island in Senegal where the slaves were held for transshipment to the West. There separate cave, or holding cells, for women, children, men, and young girls (who fetched the best price). There was also a smaller cell which was used to house men as a punishment.

I realized that because our ancestors were uprooted from their homes, sold into slavery, like Joseph, and sent to live in a foreign land – an unwilling sacrifice – we now live a different life here in the West. But I know someone who willingly made the greatest sacrifice for the whole world. His name is Jesus. He went like a lamb to the slaughter and uttered not a word. He came so that we can have a more abundant life.

People live on the island now. There are homes, a church, businesses and a school. There is a look of contentment or acceptance on their faces. It is quiet, serene and tranquil. I did not see people walking around with cell phones on their hips or on their ears. No blowing of car horns, no hurrying to and fro. I wondered who is better off: they, who are content with the little they have, or us, with our plenty, and still wanting more? We're always wanting bigger TVs, faster internet, the latest cell phone, new clothes for the season; we upgrade this and supersize that.

Min. Henley held a 3-day workshop for the women of the Guiding Light Church. The theme was "Living" the Lords Prayer. I was honored and privileged to work with a small group of these ladies, although I felt so inadequate. But God is so good. He empowered and enabled me. To Him be all the glory. They were amazing, wonderful and beautiful. Their faces hid the trials and persecution they endured for the gospel of Jesus Christ, for being Christians in a predominantly Muslim country.

Let us be fervent in our prayers forth Guiding Light Ministries and the persecuted Church. To God be the glory, great things He continues to do. ■
