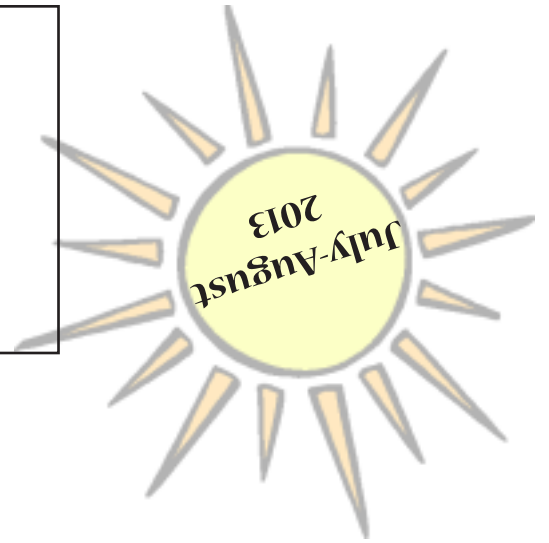
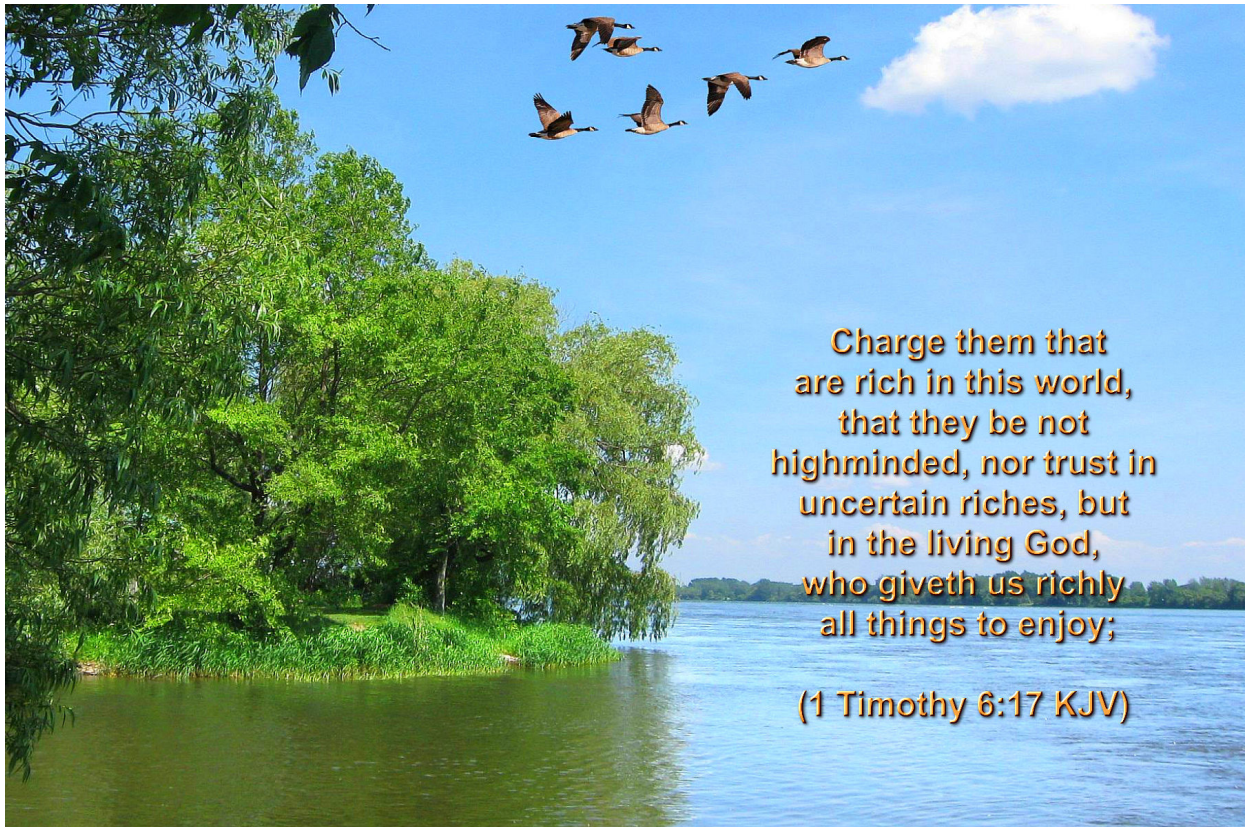
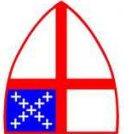

From the Rector

The soul will not rest until it comes to the original idea, in which all things are one. And there it comes to rest in God. - Meister Eckhart

When the Presiding Bishop, Katherine Jefferts Schori, visited our Diocese five years ago, she said that our mission as Christians is the Kingdom of God – and our ministry is how we get there. This high calling of ministry is not the clergy's alone: all Christians, as the prayer book states, are called “to represent Christ and his Church; to bear witness to him wherever they may be and, according to the gifts given them, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world; and to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church.” As high as this calling may be, if we take it seriously, we are soon brought low by the recognition of our own utter inability to achieve anything worthwhile. So we humbly come before God in prayer, acknowledging our dependence and asking for the grace to sustain us.

Prayer is relationship to God. But mostly, we try to live out this relationship through hard work—through visioning and programs, in time spent and dollars raised, by seeking to grow, being relevant, developing relationships, by adding value to people's lives—all in the name of ministry. These things are good, no doubt. Far too often, however, our trust in our own power to act distances us from the divine life within us. While a busy church may be, on some level, a successful church, the habits of culture that govern our varied lives sometimes cause us to be overwhelmed with the many concerns and anxieties of the world. As the rate of change in culture continues to increase along with the complexity of issues in our technological society, the anxiety in church marches in step.

This is a particular problem for clergy, who no longer can depend on their traditional theological education to see their way through the confusion. Many clergy, facing situations of diminishing resources, a rapidly changing religious climate, and aging congregational demographics, feel woefully unequipped to deal with the demands of contemporary ministry. In fact, clergy have higher rates of alcoholism, divorce, hypertension, obesity, and depression than most Americans. Feeling inadequate to the task, many clergy seek ways to bolster their skill-sets. Some attend conferences to become better preachers, fundraisers, administrators, pastoral caregivers or spiritual directors. There is a whole industry today that makes a lot of money off of churches that are struggling and clergy who no longer know what their job is supposed to be.

I drove by a church recently, and on the marquee out front were these words, “Prayer is making time to be fully human.” What a profound statement. We so easily allow ourselves to be pushed and pulled by life, so burdened, so busy, that we begin to lose sight of our humanity. We have forgotten the gifts of serenity, peace and patience. Our heads are swimming with so much information that we no longer see the sacredness of our lives nor witness the grace of others. We don't seem to be able to simply listen to God. A centered person is one who can live out of a center—one who is connected to the divine ground of being—and our word for this ability in the Christian tradition is Holiness. To be fully human is to open ourselves to holiness—wholeness and health, wellness and connection and communion, with God and each other.

What we need, instead of adding to our skills, is the rediscovery of the radical practice of sacred rest as a vital spiritual discipline. We must be willing to learn to consciously set aside the clatter of our industry. We must be willing to separate from the demands of a consumer culture with its diabolical need to yoke us to our labor. We must turn away from idolatry of production in order to unveil the simple gift of our being.

This August, I will be on sabbatical. The word, sabbatical, of course, comes from the Genesis story, when, following the creation of the world, God rested on the seventh day, the Sabbath. This rest, is a celebration of God, and is woven in the fabric of the Cosmos. Sabbath is given for us to mark the holiness of time.

I will enter this sabbatical by traveling to Colorado to stay a while with the monks at St. Benedict's Monastery in Snowmass. They have given me a hermitage and I will mostly be in solitude in the beautiful Rocky Mountains. What I long for, more than all else, is this solitude—to honor the holiness of time, time that is un-ordinary, time where I am not defined by roles of Priest, Father, Husband, Son, Friend, time set-apart in such a way that I can simply be present to that which is always present, time to be enveloped silently in prayer, reading, meditation and contemplation.

I am so grateful to the good people of St. James who recognize the importance of this sacred time and have provided generously for this opportunity, set-apart. In my desire for solitude, I hope you recognize your own need to work on your spiritual life and discipline. As I am away, I encourage you to seek out sacred rest. I will hold you all in my prayer and hope, somehow, by my time away, to draw you in to deeper awareness of the life of God in which we share. Please pray for me.

Welcome Pastor Nelson Gaetz

During July and August, our Lutheran brother in Christ, Pastor Nelson Gaetz, will be our celebrant at St. James. Pastor Gaetz is a retired Lutheran minister from Syracuse. He is a graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, which now serves the Episcopal Diocese as well as the Lutheran Church. He was ordained in 1971 and served St. Mark's in Baldwinsville for nine years. He was Senior/Executive Pastor of Atonement Church and Ministries in Syracuse for just over 31 years, retiring in November of 2011. For 16 years, Pastor Gaetz was



Conference Dean for Central New York. He has been married to his wife Margaret (Peggy) for 45 years. They have three grown children and 9 grandchildren.

Since 2000, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and the Episcopal church are able to share clergy, and fully recognize each other's members, ministries and sacraments as set forth in the Call to Common Mission agreement which states that the two denominations are in full communion.

We will continue to sell Singing Rooster Coffee from Haiti, with all proceeds going back to Haiti.

In an effort to streamline the ordering process, please read this section. If you have any questions, please speak with or email Karen Anderson.

Our next order will be sent on July 8, so all requests need to be made by the 7th. The coffee will be ready for pick up after July 13. We will then send another order August 12, which will be available on August 17.

New and improved (we hope) pick up procedure:

Coffee will be located in a large box in the kitchen at St. James. There will be an order form with the box. Simply take what you have ordered, indicate that you received your coffee on the form and leave a check made out to St. James with “coffee” on the memo line in Karen Anderson’s mail slot in the hallway across from the restrooms.

There are also extra bags available if you forgot to place an order. Simply check off which bags you took, and place a check in Karen’s mailbox. Regular coffee is \$10/bag, Decaf is \$11/bag.

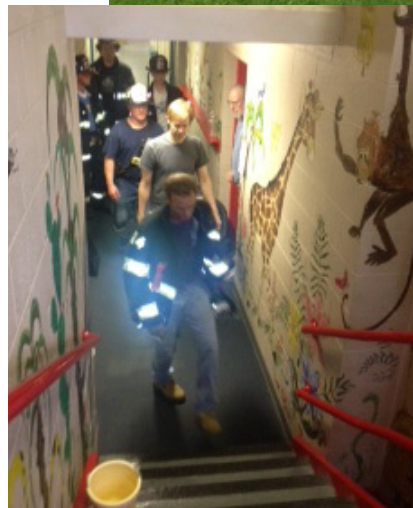
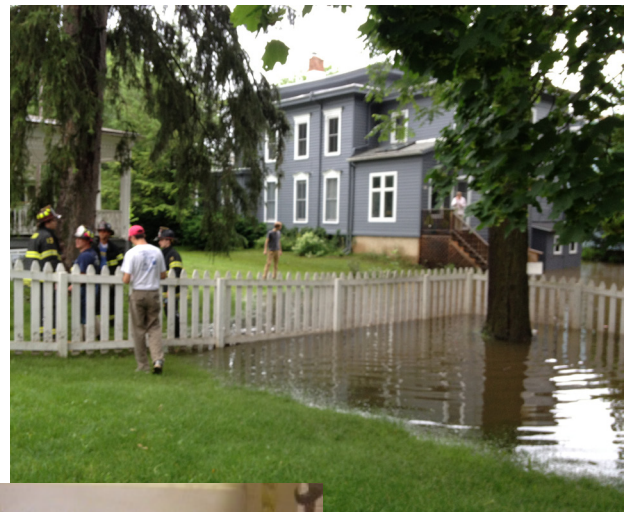
Communications Committee

The Communications Committee met on Sunday, June 30 to continue considering church management software. We hope such software will provide an easy-to-use, secure database of church members with directory information, photos (from which we can print a pictorial directory), and other information, integrated with other functions so that only one consolidated database needs to be updated when information changes. It can create groups (ushers, altar guild, acolytes, Sunday school teachers, Rite 13 youth, small group ministry members, all members, and so on) so that the software can produce lists, e-mail all people in a group, etc.; provide parishioners with online access to their own profiles in the database, so they can update, edit, upload photos; let group leaders schedule events; and integrate gracefully with the church's website.

Vestry News

At St. James it seems that we need a more safe, functional and inviting space for our programs to grow and thrive in.

Towards that end, Property Management has documented and justified 29 projects that we should complete, with a cost estimate of about \$250,000 (without overruns). I know that sounds like a lot, but we're not asking you to take our word for it. We'll be conducting walk-throughs this fall to show everyone what the plan is. Each vestry member has participated in a walk-through, and we're unanimous in our belief that we need to upgrade our facility for the next generation.

Happily, we have about \$90,000 in hand from the Lewis House sale and a directed gift, so our need is \$160,000+. The vestry thinks that's a little too much for a capital campaign, so we are asking the congregation to pledge \$125,000 over 3 years and making up the rest, if needed, by a small withdrawal from our unrestricted funds.

We think this approach is responsible and achievable, and that our membership will come together and support us because our community is worth it. We plan to fold this fund drive into our 2014 Stewardship Campaign, so you'll be hearing much more about this in October.

A lot of planning has gotten us this far and I want to thank the Property Management Committee for all their work. But they will need our support to see these projects through, so I hope you will be able to contribute not only monetarily, but with your time, encouragement, and talent as the need arises.

On another note, be aware that our J2A (Journey to Adulthood) youth program planning is underway and will be up and running this fall. This is a new youth program for our 14-17 year group – and should challenge us all to keep it fresh and relevant! If St. James is where we develop spiritually, then clearly we can provide a safe place to help our youth discover and develop a life that is rich with meaning and purpose.

I am also very excited about our Rite 13 group. We have a very nice group of people that include Emma Davis, Samantha Ellis, Kaela Ellis, Margret Jones, Robert Musante, Elizabeth Fehlner and Kylie Evans. These young people have a lot of very special talents and a nice energy to be with, and are also intrinsically motivated to learn and help others.

Godly Play Conference

On Wednesday June 19th I traveled to Toronto, Canada for a conference on a program called "Godly Play."

It opened with speaker and author Joyce Mercer, who began her lecture with a beautiful visual of a stained glass dove surrounded by brilliant light. She began to talk about play. As she spoke that evening to people who had traveled distances of up to half way around the earth, her audience was lured back to memories of a distant past. "Turn to your neighbor and describe your favorite memory..." she said. I turned to a woman I had just met 20 minutes earlier and described my favorite playmate, a brown curly headed, hazel-eyed boy who only wore superhero costumes and always had a great smile. This was my favorite playmate. When I finally stopped talking and asked her about her playmate, she said she was an only child, but had a lot of fun with the neighbors on her street. We both agreed that it was hard to find that deep rooted, engaged, uninterrupted stimulation as an adult.

"Play is important," Joyce Mercer said. For a period of immeasurable time you are transformed and transcended into a place where you are allowed to take on power and responsibility...your world is open. You can be a superhero, a Mom or Dad, a teacher, a pilot, a fashion designer, a guy who has four arms and x-ray vision. Your possibilities are endless.

This is what Godly Play is about. It is about telling a great story from Christian history and opening that story up to the many possibilities...Wondering what else could happen, wondering how the people might have felt, wondering how the weather was that day, wondering if the donkey had ever bitten anyone, wondering what their favorite food was, wondering... It is through playing with the simple wooden toys and feeling the sand on your fingers and listening to water poured into cups and sharing a feast that imaginations start to wonder and play begins and opens our minds to all of the possibilities that exist.

This was truly an inspiring experience. It was wonderful to discover more about this Montessori style of learning and listen to ideas with people from all over the world who use this program in their churches. I look forward to implementing some of the techniques I learned in the upcoming 2013-2014 Godly Play School year.
